
2018 Progress Report

Kansas has mixed signals in its federal data. Both the rate of bicycling to work and the rate of bicyclist traffic fatalities show modest trends that are bad for bicyclists over the last decade.

However, Kansas, somewhat surpisingly, has one of the five best trends for the use of federal funding for bicycling and walking. This is in part due to Kansas reaching a low of less than .1% of its federal funds spent on bicycling and walking in 2011.

In recent years, Kansas has rallied to be above both the national and Midwestern regional average in three of the last four years. This recent rally is also reflected in the update that we received regarding the actions of the Kansas Department of Transportation.

- Wine Meets Gravel.






Featured Agency - Kansas Department of Transportation

There is a lot of action to report from Kansas.

According to advocates in the state "KS DOT began the internal planning process for a new state Pedestrian and Bicycle Transportation Plan (PBTP)." If all goes well, the budget for the statewide plan will be approved so that the planning process can be funded within two years.

In preparation for the state's upcoming bicycle and pedestrian plan, "In February of 2018, Kansas's Executive Safety Council approved the motion to include a Pedestrian and Bicycle Safety Emphasis Area in the state's 2019 Strategic Highway Safety Plan."

"KS (DOT and FHWA) have also participated in USDOT's EDC4/STEP program and will soon coordinate a training program for the state's district and area engineers. The EDC4/STEP program has helped KS draft a KS DOT Action Plan for Implementing Pedestrian Crossing Countermeasures at Uncontrolled Locations. We anticipate this will become and internal policy or guidance for including pedestrian and bicycle safety features within other projects (new construction and maintenance)."



Every member organization of the League of American Bicyclists gets free access to a powerful advocacy software package. In 2017, the League facilitated over a dozen actions that engaged thousands of people. In New Jersey, these efforts led to a law that requires that drivers are educated about bicyclist and pedestrian safety as part of their driver's license training.
