KEY STEPS TO SILVER



- » Continue to increase the amount of high quality bicycle parking throughout the community. Ensure that people arriving by bicycle have a secure and legal place to lock their bikes at popular destinations through the use of bike corrals, bike valets, and incentives or requirements for bike parking in buildings.
- » Improve Bike Month activities by creating a Bike to Work Day event. Bike to Work Day events can include competitions for participation between businesses and "energizer" stations where people can get coffee on the way to work.
- » Ensure that your Complete Streets policy is followed for all projects. Ensuring compliance with a Complete Streets policy

- is an important and often low-cost way to add to your bicycle network. Striping bicycle lanes as part of repaving operations can save 40% of the cost of adding a bicycle lane.
- » Mandatory registration requirements and road lane riding restrictions (mandatory bike lane use) can be significant barriers to some people choosing to use a bicycle. You should review your local ordinances and any data on citations and crashes that is available to understand whether your current ordinances are necessary and accomplish the purposes that led to their adoption. There are non-enforcement methods of addressing the reasons for these ordinances.
