## KEY STEPS TO SILVER



- » Ensure that your Complete Streets policy is followed for all projects, and that compliance is tracked. If necessary, revisit your Complete Streets policy and process to ensure better compliance.
- » Continue to increase the amount of high quality bicycle parking throughout the community. Develop community-wide Bicycle Parking Standards to ensure that APBP-compliant bicycle parking is available in areas near transit and urban activity centers.
- Consider launching a bike share system that is open to the public.
- » Expand bicycle safety education to be a routine part of education for students of all ages, and ensure that schools and the surrounding neighborhoods are particularly safe and convenient for biking and walking. Work with local bicycle groups and interested parents to create Safe Routes to School programming for all K-12 schools.
- » Expand bicycle education opportunities for adults. Consider ways to target demographics who currently do not feel safe riding with classes or events that address their concerns.

- » Host a League Cycling Instructor (LCI) seminar to increase the number of local LCIs in your community.
- Develop a community-wide trip reduction ordinance/program, incentive program, and/or a Guaranteed Ride Home program to encourage and support bike commuters in Brentwood.
- » Provide education to law enforcement officers on bicycle safety and traffic laws as they apply to bicyclists and motorists and bicycling skills.
- » Continue efforts to improve data-driven road safety operations and Vision Zero activities. Develop a coordinated and comprehensive Vision Zero plan and program.
- » Increase the amount of staff time spent on improving conditions for people who bike and walk.
- » Create a bicycle count program that utilizes several methods of data collection to create an understanding of current bicyclists and the effects of new facilities on bicycling in Brentwood.
