KEY STEPS TO SILVER



- Install a bicycle wayfinding system with distance and destination information at strategic locations around the community, integrating preferred on-street and off-street facilities. Wayfinding may be particularly useful at intersections and along routes that may be likely to attract non-regular bicycle riders.
- Expand bicycle safety education to be a routine part of education for students of all ages, and ensure that all schools and the surrounding neighborhoods are particularly safe and convenient for biking and walking. Work with local bicycle groups and interested parents to create Safe Routes to School programming for all K-12 schools, including Middle and High Schools.
- Develop education and encouragement outreach methods and programs that specifically target women, seniors, low-income, and non-English speaking communities, in addition to families and general nontargeted outreach and media campaigns that discuss current and new bicycle facilities, safe driver and bicyclist behavior, and events related to walking and biking.
- Provide education to law enforcement officers on bicycle safety, bicycling skills, and traffic laws as they apply to bicyclists and motorists. Develop a bike patrol unit to improve bicyclist/officer relations, and ensure that law enforcement officers who are not certified or trained as bicycle patrol officers nevertheless have basic training or experience with bicycling in your community in order to foster positive interactions between bicyclists and police officers.
- Increase the amount of staff time spent on improving conditions for people who bike and walk, either by creating a new dedicated position or expanding the responsibilities of current staff.
- » Begin the process of creating a new Bicycle Master Plan or updating your 2010 bike plan. An important first step to this process will be public outreach including surveys and engagement with current and potential bicyclists. Regularly updating your bicycle plan is key to improving conditions for bicycling, adhering to evolving best practices and national standards, and institutionalizing processes for continual evaluation and improvement.
