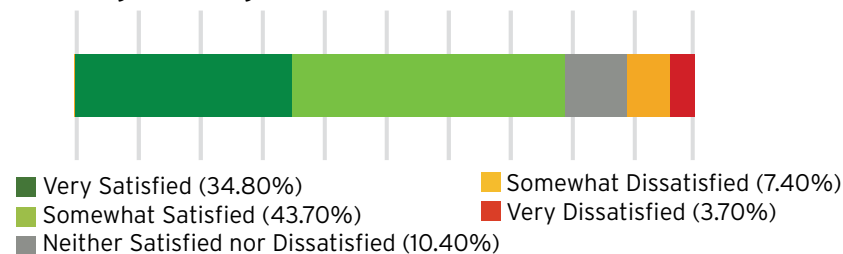

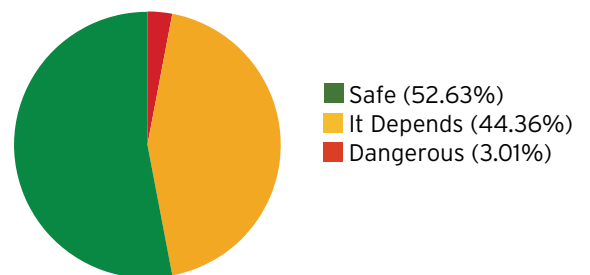

About this Report Card

The following scores are based on the online application submitted by Normal in the Fall 2023 Bicycle Friendly Community (BFC) submission round. These scores reflect a combination of automatically-generated points earned through the online application, as well as judge-assigned points and bonus points given by BFC reviewers.

The League updated its Bicycle Friendly Community application and awards criteria in 2022, after nearly a year of research, focus groups, interviews, listening sessions, and other outreach. The updated application includes a new section on Equity and Accessibility, and other changes throughout. As such, **this Bicycle Friendly Community Report card is a beta version** as we refine our new scoring system and develop a greater understanding of how to convey new information.

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FEEDBACK TO IMPROVE:

To maintain and improve on Normal's Bronze-level Bicycle Friendly Community award, BFC Reviewers recommend...

- » Congratulations on adopting the 2020 update of your Bicycle & Pedestrian Master Plan. This plan will be a blueprint for improvements and has many great recommendations for a more connected network of safe and comfortable bicycle facilities. Ensure that there is dedicated funding for the implementation of all types of bicycle infrastructure recommended by the new plan.
- » Continue to expand and improve Normal's low-stress on-road bike network and ensure that your community systematically follows a bicycle facility selection criteria that increases separation and protection of bicyclists based on levels of motor vehicle speed and volume, to maximize safety and comfort for bicyclists of all ages and abilities. Identify gaps and add new facilities that complete and expand the bicycle network, and work to upgrade existing facilities, such as by converting bike lanes into protected bike lanes, and upgrading roads with sharrows into dedicated bicycle boulevards.
- » Lower speed limits -- and designed speeds -- on residential streets to 20 mph or less. Embrace the Safe System Approach (<https://www.transportation.gov/NRSS/SafeSystem>) and introduce road diets and traffic calming measures to ensure compliance with your new lower speed limits. Develop a system of bicycle boulevards, utilizing these quiet neighborhood streets, that creates an attractive, convenient, and comfortable cycling environment welcoming to cyclists of all ages and skill levels. Use the Bicycle Boulevards section of the NACTO Urban Bikeway Design Guide for design guidelines. Reviewers are encouraged to hear that conversations about lowering residential speed limits are already ongoing thanks to the region's Go:Safe Plan, and we look forward to seeing progress on this in Normal's next BFC application.
- » Continue to increase the amount of high quality bicycle parking throughout the community, and to upgrade the quality of existing bike parking to meet APBP standards. Adopt an updated bike parking ordinance for new and existing buildings that specifies the amount and location of secure, convenient bike parking available. Develop community-wide Bicycle Parking Standards that adhere to current APBP guidelines. (See www.apbp.org/bicycle-parking-solutions).
- » Continue efforts to re-launch a new public bike share system to replace the Zagster system that recently ceased operations. Bike sharing is a convenient, cost effective, and healthy way of encouraging locals and visitors to make short trips by bike, make bicycling more accessible to all, and to bridge the 'last mile' between public transit and destinations.
- » Encourage the City of Bloomington to apply to the Bicycle Friendly Community program, and continue working with both Bloomington and the McLean County Regional Planning Commission (MCRPC) to coordinate on establishing a well-connected region-wide low-stress bicycle network, as well as cohesive and consistent plans, policies, and programming across jurisdictions.
- » Improve bicycle safety education for students of all ages by incorporating on-bicycle education opportunities and by expanding the program to all K-12 schools. Providing bicycles in schools for on-bike education ensures that all students can learn to safely ride a bicycle regardless of the availability of a bicycle in their household. Work with the school district, local bicycle groups like the Friends of the Constitution Trail, and interested parents to expand and improve the Safe Routes to School program.
- » Increase the number of local League Cycling Instructors (LCIs) in your community, either by hosting an LCI seminar or sponsoring a City staffer or local bike advocate to attend an existing seminar elsewhere. Having several active instructors in the area will enable you to expand cycling education for youth and adults, recruit more knowledgeable cycling ambassadors, deliver Bicycle Friendly Driver education to motorists, and have experts available to assist in encouragement programs.
- » Work with MCRPC to develop a region-wide trip reduction ordinance/program, commuter incentive program, and/or a Guaranteed Ride Home program to encourage and support bike commuters in McLean County.



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FEEDBACK TO IMPROVE, CONTINUED:

- » Encourage more local businesses, agencies, and organizations to promote cycling to their employees and customers and to seek recognition through the Bicycle Friendly Business program. City Hall or other municipal buildings could apply to the BFB program as an employer to lead by example among other local employers.
- » Encourage Illinois State University to use the League's feedback from their 2018 Honorable Mention Bicycle Friendly University (BFU) application, and/or to reapply to the BFU program in 2024 to help identify new ways the campus and administrators can support bicycling safety and promotion to students, staff, faculty, neighboring residents, and visitors.
- » Encourage Heartland Community College to apply to the Bicycle Friendly University program as well. BFU application fee discounts are available for community colleges – contact bfa@bikeleague.org for more information.
- » Continue to develop a bicycle count program that utilizes several methods of data collection including automated bicycle counters to provide long-term data on bicycle use at fixed points and mobile counters to provide periodic or before/after data related to changes in your community's road or bicycle network. Observational counts and surveys can supplement automated data in order to collect demographic information and examine social equity goals.
