Feedback

- Adopt a vulnerable road user law with a minimum safe passing distance to address bicyclist safety.
- Focus Complete Streets training to fight the perception implementation simply means adding a sidepath to a street instead of bike lanes, sidewalks, and other design treatments.
- Adopt federal funding project rating criteria that incentivize bicycle projects and accommodations. The state is spending a low amount, less than 0.99 percent, of federal funding on bicyclists and pedestrians, particularly on transportation enhancements.
- Bicycle ridership, while good, must continue to increase. Determine barriers that people face when bicycling and implement a comprehensive strategy to reduce barriers and increase ridership.
- Hold a bicycle ride sponsored by the Governor and/or legislators to show their constituents that their elected officials support bicycling.
- Adopt a statewide bicycle plan that addresses each of the five "Es", has clear implementation actions, and performance metrics to gauge success.
