## Summary

West Virginia has the unfortunate distinction of being the state with the fewest people choosing to bike to work relative to other modes. This lack of people biking to work casts a shadow over some good state and local efforts to improve the safety and mobility of people who bike. These efforts include having more Bicycle Friendly Actions than average, a reported \$5 million in state funding for bicycling and walking, and category scores that are close to average.

The Education & Encouragement category, which includes data on bicycling to work and reflects the low rate of biking to work and lack of growth in biking to work, is the one category that stands out as far below average. While it would be easy to pin this on the federal data, which is harder to affect, there are also many actions within the control of the state government, such as investing in education materials that can help people get riding and riding safely. This figure is based upon fatalities reported over a five-year period according to the National Highway Administration (NHTSA)'s Fatality Analysis Reporting System and the 2015 5-year ACS estimate of the number of bicycle commuters. FHWA spending is based upon projects coded using any of three project types associated with bicycling and walking projects through the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA)'s Fiscal Management Information System. To calculate per capita spending we used a five-year average for fiscal years 2011-2016 and the 2015 5-year ACS state population estimate.

# **Feedback Points**

Provide specific training to engineers and planners on how to plan, design, and implement bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure, including protected bike lanes, safe rural bicycling routes, and other facilities that have become more widespread in recent years. Significant changes in best practices have occurred recently and training is essential to ensuring that communities in your state have access to the best possible solutions for their bicycle and pedestrian safety and mobility issues.

Adopt a law prohibiting a motorist from opening an automobile's door unless the motorist is able to do so safely. West Virginia is one of only 9 states without a law protecting people who bike from "dooring." West Virginia has done considerable work to create draft maps and supporting documents for its statewide bicycle connectivity plan. This plan should be finalized so that it can provide a basis for state and local collaboration, long-term planning, tourism development, and additional funding.

Allow the flexibility for all units of government statewide to use NACTO and AASHTO standards as well as the state's own design standards. Or, alternatively incorporate NACTO and AASHTO standards into state design standards and guidance.

Since 2015, West Virginia adopted bicyclist safety as an emphasis area in its Strategic Highway Safety Plan as part of the Continuing Successful Safety Programs & Initiatives emphasis area. This should make it easier to fund bicycle safety improvements in the state.



West Virginia does a poor job of using federal funding for biking and walking improvements. On a per capita basis, West Virginia spends the 6th least of any state. The state DOT, and legislature, should make changes so that more federal funding is used on biking and walking. This may include allocating state funds to match federal funds in communities that cannot meet the matching requirements of federal programs.
