



Based on the information we obtained for Idaho, the League of American Bicyclists believes the following actions will improve the safety, comfort, and accessibility of bicycling in Idaho.

Adopt a statewide Complete Streets policy, such as a state law to ensure all projects receiving state and federal funding provide safe places for people to bike and walk.

Adopt a safe passing law with a minimum distance of 3 feet to address bicyclist safety. Over the last two decades most states have adopted a safe passing law to protect people biking. Idaho is one of 11 states that

Spend at least 2% of federal transportation funds on biking and walking improvements.

The League of American Bicyclists has accepted the 2014 Bicycle and Pedestrian Study as Idaho's Bike Plan for several years. Planning for an update should already be underway if the League is to continue recognizing Idaho as having a Bike Plan adopted within the last ten years. The 2014 study notably does not discuss separated and protected bike lanes, which should be included in an update.

Idaho's Strategic Highway Safety Plan Emphasis for bicycle and pedestrian safety adopts a strategy to "Include construction and maintenance of appropriate facilities for all users on all projects as appropriate." Adopting a Complete Streets policy or law would institutionalize this strategy.
