



Based on the information we obtained for Nebraska, the League of American Bicyclists believes the following actions will improve the safety, comfort, and accessibility of bicycling in Nebraska.

Adopt a statewide Complete Streets policy or other policy that institutionalizes planning, designing, and building safe places for people to bike and walk as part of the transportation system.

Adopt a statewide Bike Plan or Active Transportation Plan. Nebraska is one of just 8 states that have never adopted a statewide Bike Plan.

Make bicycle safety an emphasis area in your Strategic Highway Safety Plan with identified strategies for engineering improvements.

Since our 2019 Bicycle Friendly State ranking, Nebraska has more than doubled its per capita federal spending on biking and walking projects. This is great progress. A statewide bike plan can reinforce this improvement and coordinate additional improvements.

Nebraska should update its Engineering Design Standards to include protected bike lanes. According to our survey data, Nebraska does not have standards for protected bike lanes, does not have training on their design or implementation, and does not have any protected bike lanes on state roads.
