FEEDBACK

In Spring of 2024, the Colorado DOT kicked off an update to its Statewide Active Transportation Plan. This is great to hear as the previous plan was adopted in 2012 and the League of American Bicyclists recommends a 10-year update cycle to ensure that plans incorporate leading engineering practices.

Colorado sets default urban area speed limits above 20 miles per hour and does not provide clear legal authority or guidance for how communities may establish 20 mile per hour speed limits on streets in urban or residential areas. We know that slow road save lives and clearer laws and guidance supporting slower streets will benefit the safety of all people using Colorado's streets.

Congratulations on spending at least 2% of federal transportation funds on biking and walking improvements. The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law has provided increased federal funding for transportation and it is great to see it resulting in greater investments in bicycling and walking improvements.

The Colorado DOT's Greenhouse Gas Planning Standard to reduce greenhouse gas emissions from the transportation sector is an exciting development. This standard requires projects to account for the total pollution and greenhouse gas emissions increase or decrease they are expected to cause in federally-required planning documents.
