FEEDBACK

The Maine Department of Transportation adopted its first-ever Active Transportation Plan in 2023. This is a great step to providing guidance, strategy, and policy for improving bicycling and walking in the state. It is great to see continued efforts with a Complete Streets policy update ongoing.

Spend at least 2% of federal transportation funds on biking and walking improvements. Local advocates report recent increases in funding for bicycling and walking projects, so make sure those efforts are reported and reflected in federal data.

Maine spends a very low amount of federal funding on biking and walking per capita. Spend more and/or improve reporting practices to make sure your investments are counted.

The Maine vulnerable road user law requires law enforcement officers to, within five days of investigating a crash, inform a district attorney of their belief that the law can be invoked and file a final report within 60 days. This is a unique new law and the League looks forward to monitoring its implementation.

The Maine Department of Transportation adopted its first-ever Active Transportation Plan in 2023. It is great to see a vision where MaineDOT will maintain, improve, and expand safe active transportation options statewide to improve pedestrian and bicyclist safety, expand mobility, support economic development, reduce emissions, and enhance public health for Maine people and visitors alike.

TOP TIP

Spend at least 2% of federal transportation funds on biking and walking improvements. Maine has not met this key Bicycle Friendly Action metric in any year since 2012.
