#### **FEEDBACK**

Congratulations on adopting a safe passing law with a minimum distance of 3 feet to address bicyclist safety. Publicize the law so that drivers, law enforcement, and other members of the public are aware of it.

Legally enabled safety zones allow transportation agencies to post 20 mph speed limits after approval by the elected body responsible for a jurisdiction. Provide guidance and support for communities interested in using this law.

MassDOT's Shared Streets and Spaces Grant Program has awarded \$50 million dollars total to 183 municipalities resulting in 494 projects. The program continues to be a model for other states by providing technical and funding assistance to help Massachusetts municipalities conceive, design, and implement changes to curbs, streets, plazas, and parking areas in support of public health and safe mobility.

### ONE SUCCESS

Massachusetts adopted a safe passing law with a defined safe distance of 3 feet. Massachusetts has now taken all five of our key Bicycle Friendly Actions!

**TOP TIP** 

Massachusetts had the highest score for our Every Ride Counts category but has indicated that it would like to do more to establish a comprehensive program of before/after counts to evaluate progress while making the case for increased cycling facilities statewide. This would be a tremendous step as a leader in counting practices.
