## FEEDBACK

Adopt a statewide Complete Streets policy or other policy that institutionalizes planning, designing, and building safe places for people to bike and walk as part of the transportation system. Ohio is one of only 14 states without a resolution, policy, or law that addresses creating a transportation system for all of the ways that people move.

Ohio sets default urban area speed limits above 20 miles per hour and does not provide clear legal authority or guidance for how communities may establish 20 mile per hour speed limits on streets in urban areas. We know that slow road save lives and clearer laws and guidance supporting slower streets will benefit the safety of all people using Ohio's streets.

Ohio has a bicyclist fatality rate worse than the national average. Since 2015, 36% of bicyclist fatalities have been on state owned roadways despite those roads accounting for only 16% of Ohio's roadways. Arterial roadways accounted for 42% of bicyclist deaths, more than any other roadway type. Addressing arterial roads is key to improving bicycle safety.

The Bike.Walk.Ohio plan is a great plan with model plans on which communities can build their own. Support implementation of the plan and ensure that all district offices are working in a coordinated manner to improve safety for people biking and walking.

ONE SUCCESS

The Ohio DOT's Safer Streets Pilot Program was launched with \$25 million in funding to promote safer street designs by working with Ohio communities. This is a promising effort, particularly for addressing dangerous arterial roads.

Adopt a statewide Complete Streets law or policy that codifies the common-sense notion that transportation projects should consider all people who might use them.
