FEEDBACK

Adopt a safe passing law with a minimum distance of 3 feet to address bicyclist safety. South Carolina is one of only 10 states that does not define a safe distance.

In 2022, South Carolina adopted its first-ever statewide Pedestrian and Bicycle Safety Plan. This should provide a basis for investments, safety improvements, and coordination with communities throughout the state.

Spend at least 2% of federal transportation funds on biking and walking improvements. Over the last five years, 17% of traffic fatalities in South Carolina have been people biking or walking, and funding should reflect the need to invest in their safety.

South Carolina regularly meets the threshold for the federal Vulnerable Road User Special Rule and therefore is required to spend Highway Safety Improvement Program funds on vulnerable road user safety. The state's bike plan should inform these safety investments.

South Carolina has a bicyclist fatality rate worse than the national average. In the last five years, more than 80% of bicyclist fatalities occurred on state-owned arterial roadways according to NHTSA data. Improve those roadways to improve bicycle safety.

TOP TIP

Spend at least 2% of federal transportation funds on biking and walking improvements. Over the last five years, 17% of traffic fatalities in South Carolina have been people biking or walking, and funding should reflect the need to invest in their safety.
