#### FEEDBACK

Utah sets default urban area speed limits above 20 miles per hour and does not provide clear legal authority or guidance for how communities may establish 20 mile per hour speed limits on streets in urban or residential areas. We know that slow road save lives and clearer laws and guidance supporting slower streets will benefit the safety of all people using Utah's streets.

Spend at least 2% of federal transportation funds on biking and walking improvements. Utah has not met this key Bicycle Friendly Action metric since 2012 and has not spent 1% of its federal funds on biking and walking since 2014. While there may be advantages to using state funds for bicycling projects, federal funds typically cover 80% of project costs and the choice to not use federal funds for biking and walking misses out on that opportunity.

Utah spends the lowest reported amount of federal funding on biking and walking per capita. Spend more and/or improve reporting practices to make sure your investments are counted.

In contrast to the reported use of federal funding, Utah spends significant state funding on biking and walking. This includes the vision of a state-funded trail network program where UDOT will work with local communities to build and maintain trails as part of the state's transportation system.

**TOP TIP** 

Utah's low use of federal funding for biking and walking makes the state's efforts difficult to evaluate as it appears to reflect a policy choice to use state rather than federal funds for biking and walking.
